# A Brief Profile of the College

## Location

Bhatter College, Dantan is an undergraduate, coeducational college situated at Dantan, a rural centre in the district of Paschim Medinipur, West Bengal (Coordinates: 21.933947°N, 87.279402°E) on the South-western border between West Bengal and Orissa. The college is located amidst a very charming sylvan natural setting with the river Subarnarekha flowing past the region on the western side. The region beyond the river on the western side is Jungle Mahal with thick forests and tribal resources. The Bay of Bengal lies about 50 km away from Dantan.

## Climate

The climate in Dantan follows a hot-tropical monsoon pattern with highs in the mid 40°C in the summer (generally April to June), mid 30°C during the monsoon season (June to August) and low 30°C for most of the other times of the year. Winters (December to January) are usually mild with lows in the 10°C and highs in the low to mid 20°C. Most of the precipitation is from the southeast monsoon which may bring in excess of 1500 mm of rainfall. Tornadoes are relatively rare in West Bengal, but one did occur on March 24, 1998 killing over 250 near Dantan.

## A little History about Dantan

It has been established that modern-day Dantan is actually the contracted region of the ancient kingdom of Dandabhukti dating from the 6<sup>th</sup> century AD. The archaeological findings of the Moghalmari Buddhist Monastery, the largest of its kind in West Bengal, few ancient settlement sites and numerous artefacts point to its rich past spanning over 600 years (6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> century AD). But because of its strategic position, the area turned into a frequent battleground afterwards and the entire region sank into deprivation and degradation with the establishment of the British rule. Modern-day Dantan started to rise after the Independence, and the establishment of Bhatter College was a part of that process.

## Foundation of Bhatther College, Dantan

The college was established on 5th December 1963 with the help of Sri Mathuranth Bhatther, a noted businessman and social worker of Dantan who donated Rs.1,01,101.00 for its construction. The College was named after his great family. Moreover, the people of this locality also collected donations from various comers for further development of the college.

Miss Ava Maity and Sri Prodyot Kumar Mohanty were the President and Secretary of the first Governing Body of this College respectively. Among other members of the G.B. the role of Late Charu Chandra Mohanty, Late Dasarathi Pati, Late Devendra Nath Das, Sankar Prasad Roy the then B.D.O. Dantan Block, Sri Narendra Nath Biswas, Dayalal Pujara was really worth mentioning. Sri Narendra Nath Biswas was the first acting Principal of the college.

In 1964 Late Birendra Nath Ghosal joined this College as permanent Principal. During the tenure of his service Major courses in Bengali and Political Science were introduced in the College in 1965 and 1966 respectively with affiliation from Calcutta University. Principal Ghosal's sincere effort for introducing Sanskrit Hons. in the College become subsequently fruitful.

From 1971 to 1980 Late Dr. Santosh Kumar Bhattacharyya, Ex Vice-Chancellor of Calcutta University and Ex-Head of the Department of Economics, Calcutta University, acted as the President of Governing Body of the College. Dr. Bhattacharyya made untiring efforts and took pioneering attempts toward the total development of the College. It was due to his sole endeavour that B.Com. Courses were introduced in this College in 1979. The College will remain ever indebted to Dr. Bhattacharyya and Sri Anil Basak, Secretary, West Bengal College and University Teachers' Association for the yeoman service they rendered for the amelioration of the present Institute.

In 1980 Dr. Saroj Kumar Roy, an educationist of Dantan became the president of the Governing Body. He tried his level best for the all-round progress of the College. Under his ingenious leadership on 2<sup>nd</sup> December 1987, Dr. Mrityunjoy Bhanja was appointed Principal of the College on the recommendation of the W.B. College Service Commission. After the retirement of Dr. Bhanja on 09.01.1997, the charge of the College was taken over by Prof. A. K. Pramanik, Prof. B. D. Santra, Prof. A. Mabud and Prof. R. N. Dinda Successively. On the 25<sup>th</sup> of June, 2003 Dr. Pabitra Kumar Mishra joined the college as Principal. Dr. Pabitra Kumar Mishra joined Bhatler College, Dantan in June 2003 as the Principal and started a silent revolution. Under his able leadership, in the year 2007, the college successfully got NAAC Accreditation with 'B+' Grade. In the year 2010, the college was declared a Centre of Potential for Excellence by UGC. Then came the highest honour for the college in 2015 when under the joint leadership of Shri Bikram Chandra Pradhan and Dr Pabitra Kumar Mishra, Bhatler College attained an 'A' Grade College status after NAAC reassessment. He redesigned the campus, rebuilt the infrastructure, and fixed the support services. He introduced many new courses and led major extension activities outside the college for the development of Dantan and its surrounding areas. He established Bhatler College Private ITI for the local youth and tried very hard for developing tourism at Dantan. He contributed significantly to the revival of the Sarasanka Lake. For his valuable contribution to education, he was conferred with the Siksha Ratna Award by the Govt. of West Bengal in the year 2015. After the retirement of Dr. Mishra on 31.03.2023, Prof. Tarun Tapas Mukherjee

has taken charge of the College. On 11.05.2023, Dr. Pijus Kanti Khatua joined the college as principal and continues the process of development and expansion of this institution.

### **The Mission of the Institution**

### **Category, UGC Recognition and Accreditation**

Ours is a grant-in-aid type of co-educational college affiliated to Vidyasagar University (previously to the University of Calcutta), West Bengal and enjoys UGC recognition under 2(f) and 12(B) since 1963. It was accredited by NAAC as a ‘B+’ grade College in 2007. In 2015 the college has been accredited **Grade A** with CGPA 3.01.



## Teaching-Learning

The Undergraduate courses are run according to the CBCS system of Education and the university examinations are held at the end of each semester tentatively five-six months after the commencement of the course for three years and there is a total number of Six Semesters for the Undergraduate Courses. The PG Courses are held in a regular mode in a total number of four subjects (Bengali, Education, English, History) following the CBCS system of Education and the university examinations are held at the end of each semester tentatively five-six months after the commencement of the course for two years and there is a total number of four Semesters for the Postgraduate Courses. The PG courses on Distance Mode also follow the semester system. The college arranges for unit tests, semester exams, tutorials and remedial classes. Special theoretical and practical classes are held for the benefit of the students. Traditional, as also innovative teaching methods are followed for classroom teaching making adequate use of ICT. Student seminars and debates are arranged to improve their knowledge base and communication skills. Steps are taken to increase social awareness and foster personality growth and all-round development. The NSS unit of the College, which works in close collaboration with that of Vidyasagar University, renders dedicated service to the College and to the community at large (especially through their developmental activities in nearby villages adopted by the College).

## Infrastructure

The college (having 40468.6 sq. mts of total area and 8,400 sq. mts of built-up area) operates in 10 (ten) buildings. The College Office is fully computerized. Almost all the departments have separated and dedicated departmental offices, libraries, laboratories and Major subject classrooms with ICT facilities attached to the department. It has a separate building for the Central Library which is under the supervision of a full-time librarian. It has a Computer Centre, Auditorium, Seminar Hall, an Outdoor Stadium and an Indoor Stadium, an open stage named “Abha Maity Open Stage”, canteen, separate students’ union office, Boys and Girls Common Rooms, vehicle shade, two playgrounds, garden, parks and a pond. It has a separate room for Language Lab., Multimedia Support Centre, and E-Library. It also has a Centre for Performance Studies, Centre for Yoga, Centre for Women Health, Constitution Club, and a Sports Academy. We have a College Health Centre for staff and students to provide free primary healthcare. Very recently, we have formed a Research Advisory Committee (R.A.C.) and established a Research Centre keeping in mind the insistence on research in the National Education Policy (NEP), 2020. The ITI has a separate building. There are two hostels—one for boys and one for girls. The college has a separate electric connection with a dedicated transformer to handle the load. There are two diesel generators as a power backup system for the entire college, several inverters, inter-com facilities and broadband internet connections in all departments of the college. Staff and students have free access to internet connectivity. There is a students’ support center which has photocopiers for the photocopy of documents. Additionally, we have recently installed Solar energy system and Solar Power Plant 10 Kv, Rainwater Harvesting, Waste management system in our campus.

An MoU has been signed with *Khejuri College, Purba Medinipur, West Bengal* for to collaborate for an Add-on Programme on *Composition and Diverse Adaptations of Bengali Song: Tradition and Modernity* on 18.04.2023.

Thus, the college has become a training center to train local tourist guides under the *Utkarsha Bangla Scheme of Technical Education, Training & Skill Development, Govt. of West Bengal*.

It has signed an MoU with the *Department of Performing Arts, Presidency University, Kolkata* in November 2019 to execute different collaborative projects and student exchange programmes.

Another MoU has been signed with *Belda College, West Bengal* to strengthen academic cooperation and to promote joint sponsored research, development, and the student and faculty exchange programmes.

The college in collaboration with the *Fisheries Department of Govt. of West Bengal* has started a *Demonstration-Cum-Training Centre of pisciculture for local Fishermen and Farmers*.

Bhatter College Campus Film Society has been affiliated with the Associate Member of *Federation of Film Societies of India*.

Because of its marginalized location, the college has not been able to establish substantial linkages with industry, other institutions and foreign agencies. It is a Member of the *Confederation of Indian Industry (CII)* and it will try to establish links with industry through this platform.

## Innovations

Bhatter College is the pioneer institute in West Bengal in setting up an ITI for the local youth.

It is the pioneer institution in West Bengal that organizes a Book Fair for the school children, students of the institution and the local people with the aim of spreading the light of knowledge.

It is also the first college in West Bengal to have undertaken Open Access initiatives for publishing online journals and magazines and portals for scholarly communication and dissemination.

We have introduced a Campus Bulletin/ Newsletter showcasing the highlights of our campus titled “THE BHATTER VOICE: A CAMPUS NEWS BULLETIN”

**Solar Plant**

Bhatter College, Dantan has installed a 10 KVA solar plant and energy system at the top of the roof of the Kalidas building of our college, and in the near future, we will set up a number of windmills on the top of the roof of our college building to use unconventional wind energy.

We have extended our library wing to accommodate electronic/digital resources for accessing e-contents/materials for the faculties as well as students.

We have established multiple centres and cells like Women's Cell, Grievance Cell, Covid Cell and so on.

We have established a Multimedia Support Centre for facilitating our faculty members in continuing MOP, MOOC (SWAYAM, ARPIT, etc.) courses.

We have introduced Learning Management System (LMS) which facilitates online access of study materials to the students.

We have established a 'Tourist Guide Centre' to train local tourist guides in order to promote local Eco-tourism and Archeological-tourism, as per the initiative taken by the *Utkarsha Bangla Scheme of Technical Education, Training & Skill Development, Govt. of West Bengal*.

Bhatler College, Dantan has developed a new technology for solid waste management both for the biodegradable agro-based solid waste and non-biodegradable plastics material.

It has also developed new technologies for liquid waste management and recycling systems where liquid effluents liberated from the Chemistry laboratory mainly contain different kinds of acids and bases and heavy metals chromium in potassium dichromate used in titration methods. The liberated liquid effluent is collected and stored in a long-isolated drum.

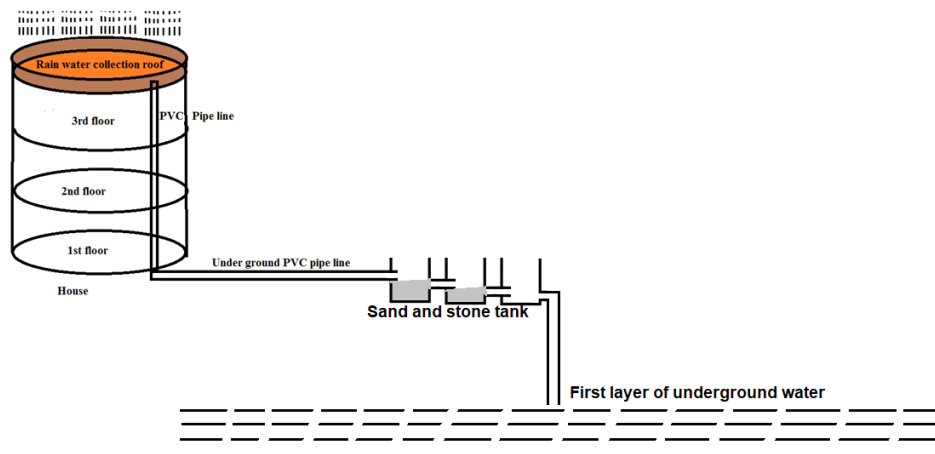
Bhatler college, Dantan has completed an Industrial Consultancy Project entitled "Development of starch and lignin free bamboo stick with anti-fungus and anti-borer properties for holding chocolate", sponsored by Rock Light Energy Pvt. Ltd. Ranchi, Jharkhand.

Bhatler College has taken an initiative for rain water harvesting in the campus. For the success of this project the College already have made the essentials as follow:

- i) A large roof (around 5000 Sq. Ft.) of Kalidas building is used for the collection of rain water throughout the year.



- 2) The clean rain water is coming through the air shield pipeline to three specially designed tanks for filtration and dissolves more oxygen.
- 3) The dissolve oxygen level and pH of water are frequently measure by Winkler's Iodometric method. In case of poor oxygen level a motor pump is used for air circulation.
- 4) Finally, the water is send through a 60 ft. GI pipe line to the first layer of underground water.

## College Administration

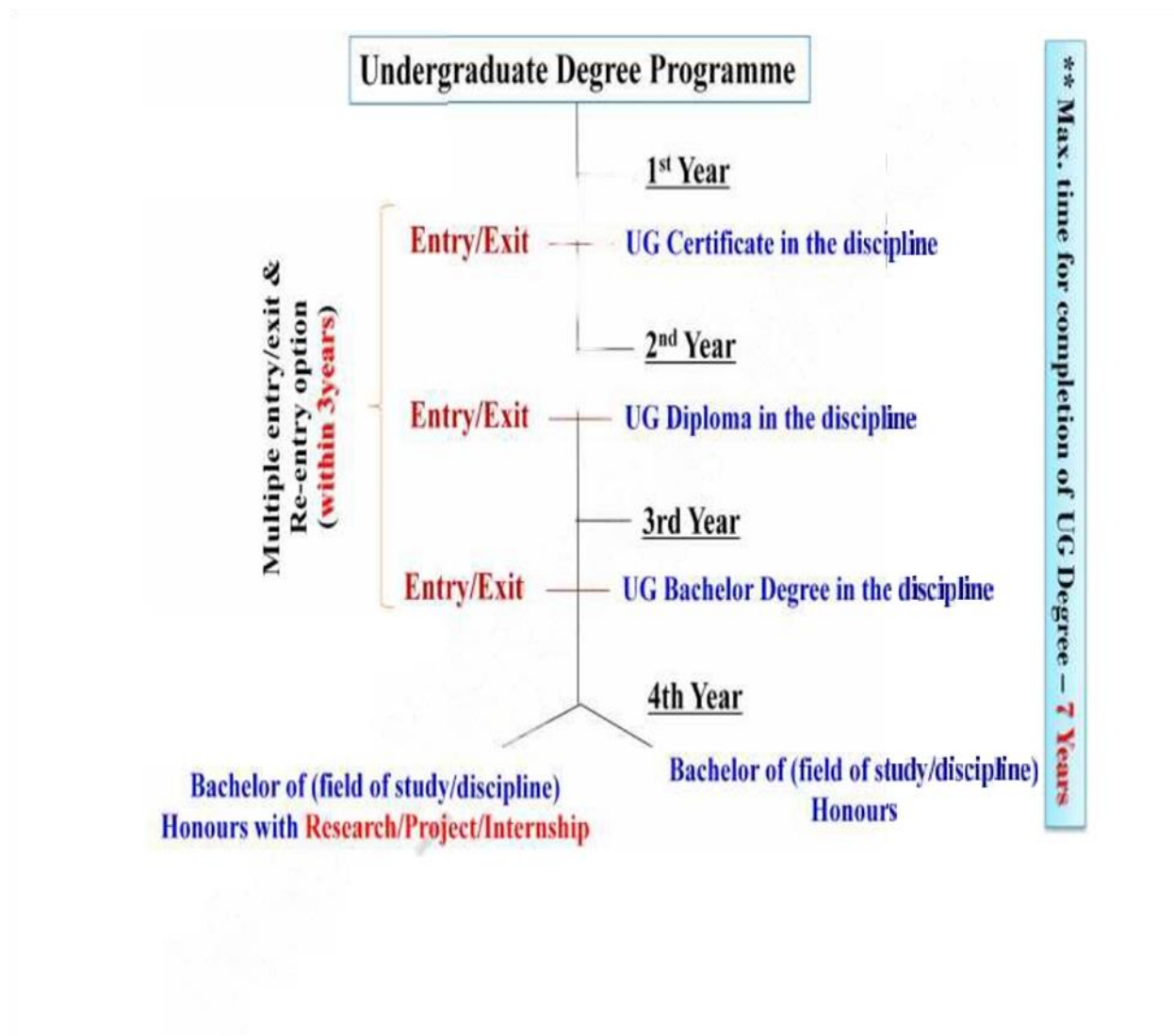

They should also display in-depth disciplinary knowledge in at least one discipline of the humanities or social sciences by applying discipline-specific problem-solving skills and expertise to address research or project-based problems.

**Future collaboration and frontiers in education:** Students should be able to demonstrate openness towards inter-disciplinary and innovative thinking; they need to perform tasks with utmost professional ethics in all fields of life while displaying outstanding academic integrity. In addition, they should develop local and global networks of collaboration and also demonstrate leadership and compassion. Finally, they should represent information and digital literacy and practice a commitment towards the expansion of the same.

coherent, and plausible argument, logical structure, proper references. Students will present orally their research or a summary of another's research in an organized, coherent, and compelling fashion.

## Admission Process

Admission of students commences as soon as the results of the Higher Secondary Examination are declared by the West Bengal Council of Higher Secondary Education.

The students are admitted strictly on the basis of merit. The merit is determined as per the following rules prescribed by the University.

Students who pass Higher Secondary or equivalent examination (10+2) with a minimum of 45% marks in the aggregate (to be calculated by adding the marks obtained in “Best Five” subjects) or 50% marks in the subject or related subject are eligible to apply for admission in the Major course.

- Students carrying pass marks in at least five subjects are eligible to apply for admission to Multidisciplinary courses.
- Admission is done on a merit basis. The Merit point for admission in the major course is calculated by adding 10% of total marks obtained in the ‘Best Five’ subjects at higher secondary/ equivalent examination and the marks obtained in the subject or a related subject in which the admission in major course is sought.
- Merit point for admission in Multidisciplinary Course is calculated by adding the marks obtained in ‘Best Five’ subjects at higher secondary/equivalent examination.
- For admission in Multidisciplinary and Major course, a student must have passed in two language subjects of which one must be English at Higher Secondary/Equivalent examination.
- Any candidate seeking admission with Economics (Hons.) or Accountancy (Hons.) must have obtained 45% marks in mathematics in the Madhyamik /equivalent examination or must have passed in Mathematics in Higher Secondary / Equivalent Examination.
- Students passing Higher Secondary Examination from Vocational stream, conducted by W.B.S.C.T&V Education or any other equivalent Board/Council may apply for admission in Multidisciplinary course only.
- Vidyasagar University has introduced the CBSC System for the students of B.Sc. (Hons.), B.A. (Hons.) and B.Com. (Hons.) students.

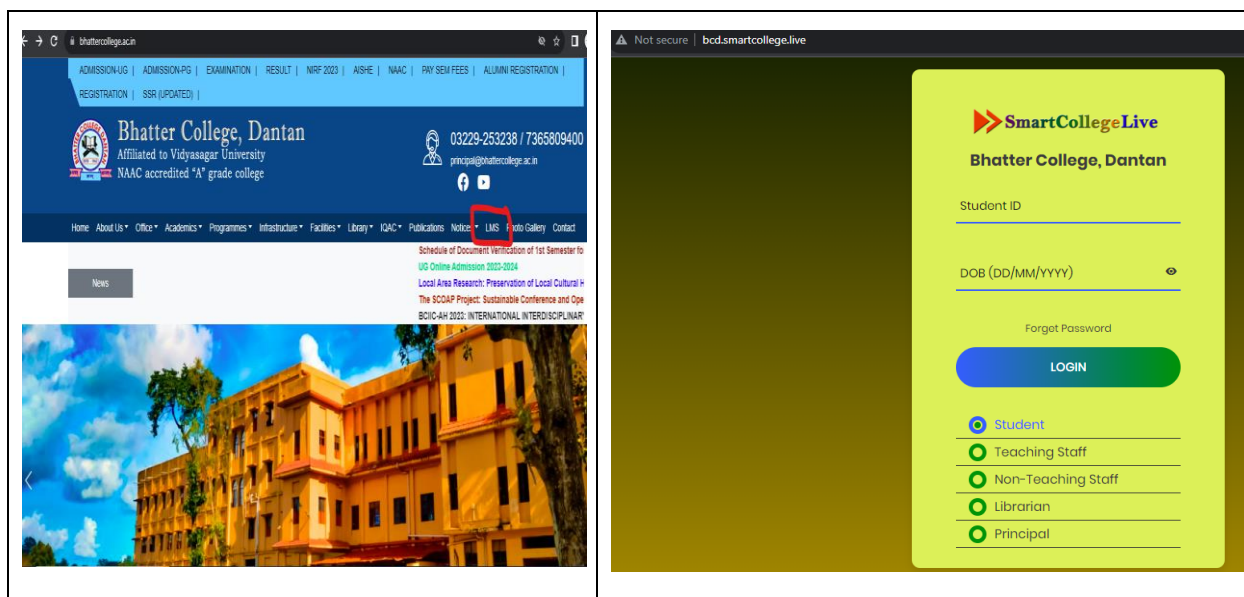

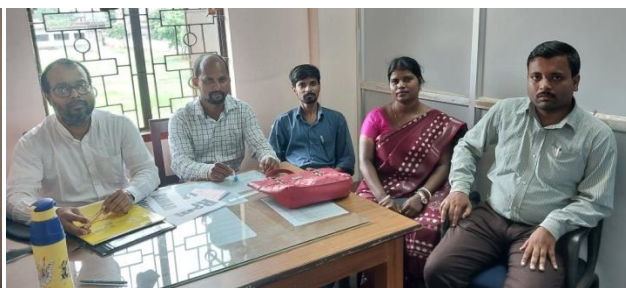

It has also organized several virtual seminars, talks and lecture series, workshops, publication and collaborative works.

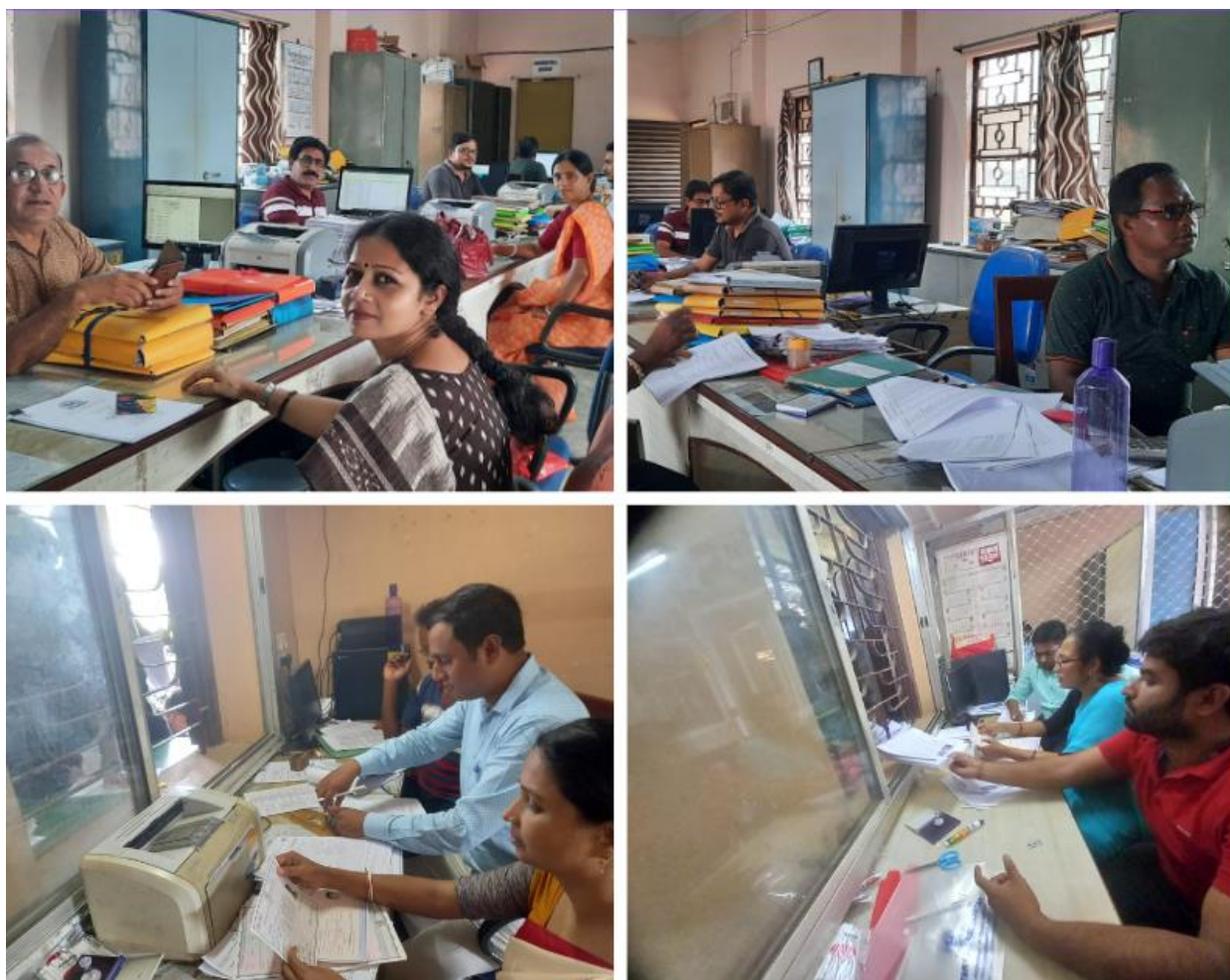

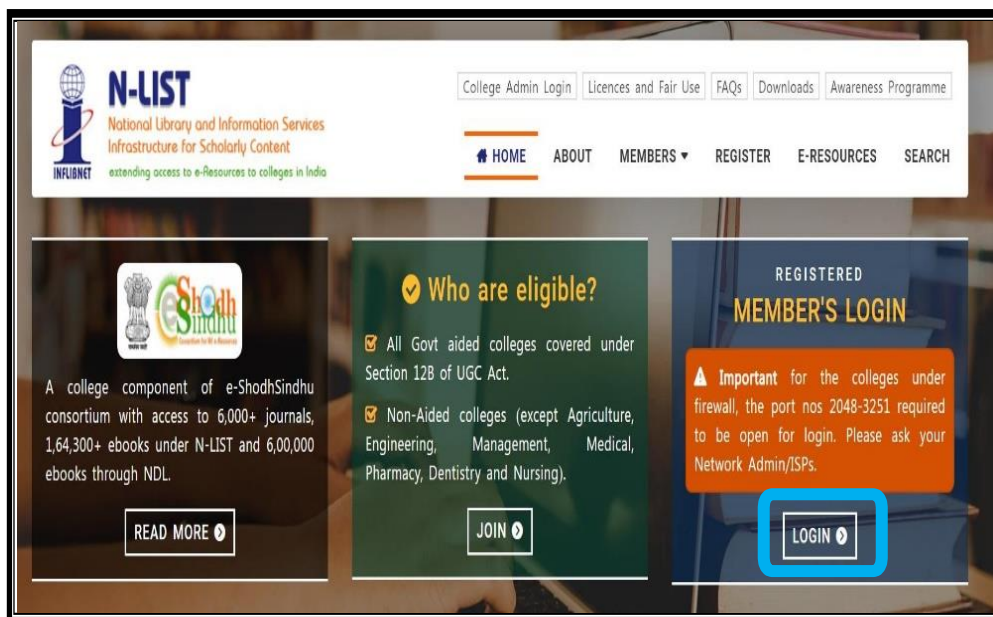

# Rules and regulations of the College
